"I think you're ready," she said and gave them some money. "Good luck!"




Their mom walked around the corner to start shopping, and the boys looked at the brand new clothes. "Wow! I want to buy everything!" Nate said.

A friendly salesclerk walked over and asked, "Can I help you?"




Neil and Nate showed him their pictures.

They looked in the mirror. "Wow! These new clothes are great!" said Nate.


"They really are," said Neil.

"They're excellent!" said Neil.


"We should buy these," said Nate.
